Regulated audiologists and speech-language pathologists are held accountable if they fail to meet the standards. 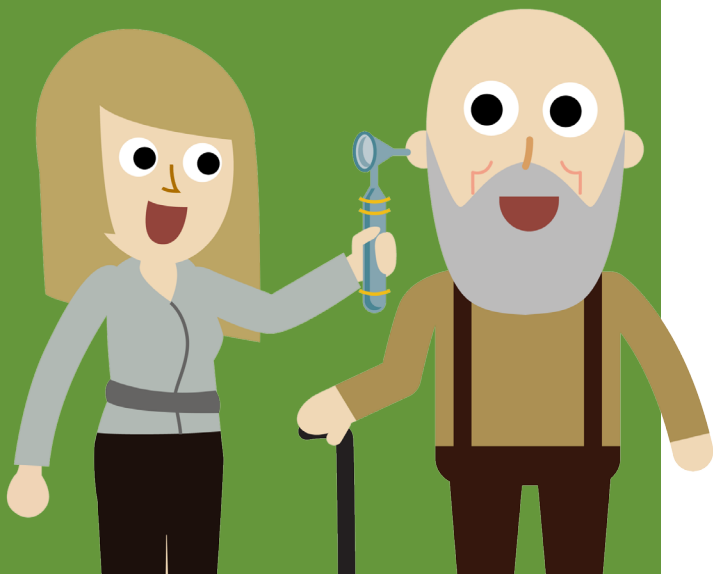

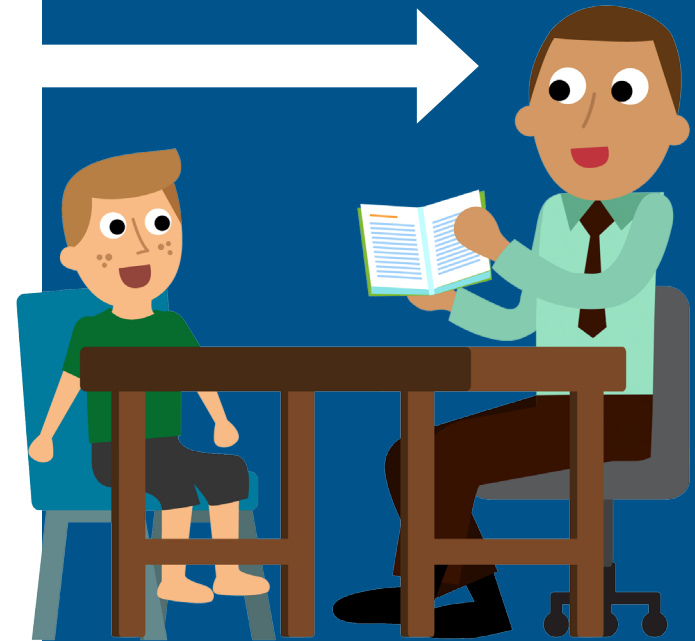


Where can I find a regulated audiologist or speech-language pathologist?

Finding a regulated audiologist or speech-language pathologist is easy using CASLPO's **online public register**. Search by city, postal code, or language to find the practitioner that best meets your needs. You can also find out if the practitioner has any restrictions on their practice, or if they have ever practiced below the standards. These details allow you to make an informed decision and feel confident in the services you receive.

Do I need a referral to see an audiologist or speech-language pathologist?

No, you do not need a referral to see an audiologist or speech-language pathologist, and can easily find one that practices in your area using CASLPO's online public register.



How do I know if I need to see an audiologist or speech-language pathologist?

These professionals are trained to work with children, adults, and seniors who are experiencing any difficulties with speech, language, communication, swallowing, hearing, balance and/or ringing in the ears. Use the self-evaluation hearing and communication checklists to find out if you or someone you know has an issue that needs intervention.
